# From the Rector

This is turning out to be the strangest Lent, Holy Week, and Easter of our lives. Perhaps our grandparents or great grandparents could tell us stories form 1917-1918 that echo our experiences.

I pray that this newsletter finds you and yours well. Some of you may know that Debbie's mother – Fay – has been hospitalized with the COVID 19 pneumonia since March  $20^{th}$ . Her condition seems to vary from day to day. The statistics we see in the news have a real face for our family. I ask for your prayers.

I'm not sure yet how Holy Week will go for us. I do know that we will observe our services online. Deacon Ed, Pastor Josh, and I are looking for creative ways that will help us through this important week in the life of the Church.

In case you are like me and inclined to want things to be as they have "always" been, let me assure you that historically the observance of Holy Week has changed repeatedly---even in my lifetime. The Book of Common Prayer 1979 reintroduced many of the elements of Holy Week and Easter that we observe here at Ascension. The 1928 BCP only had glimpses of what we now take for granted.

Finally, a reminder that the first Easter morning involved only a few people - the women at the empty tomb, the few frightened disciples, and, of course, the Risen Christ. It wasn't until Pentecost that the scriptures point to crowds.

With more time on my hands, I've been walking even more than usual. For the most part, people are friendly, keeping their distance, and sometimes even being chatty. The thing I've noticed most is that although there is a lot of concern and anger about Covid-19, there's also a deep sense of hope and a broadening realization that the world is bigger than our own little bubbles. It seems that keeping our faith real when life seems more real than usual can be a thing.

It's heartening to see that we're realizing that we are all in this together. No matter who we are, no matter where we are, we are realizing that we are all bound together globally.

Martin Luther King wrote: "In a real sense all life is inter-related. All men are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly. I can never be what I ought to be until you are what you ought to be, and you can never be what you ought to be until I am what I ought to be. This is the inter-related structure of reality."

All of humanity without exception is sacred. Each of us regardless of race, culture, religion, sexuality, politics, socio-economic status is the same – we are all wrapped in what Dr. King so poignantly describes as a single garment of humanity. And even more importantly, we are all, without exception, children of God. Our similarities far outweigh our differences and, lest we forget, the common garment of our humanity is lovingly woven stitch by stich by God – each of us a thread.

We all share the same basics of life: birth, adolescence, and, if we're lucky, old age and ultimately death. Our journeys are far more similar than we know...far more similar than we dare to imagine.

Throughout our lives there is disorder created by sickness, accidents, loss of work, the loss of friends, and the loss of loved ones.

All of life's crises destroy our agendas, our security, our carefully laid plans. We reorder our lives and we move on. We struggle at first, but we move on - that's what we do as Christians.

Although we won't be celebrating Easter together at Ascension this year, we know that Resurrection isn't a single event in time that belongs solely to Jesus. It is a gift of love and a gift of grace freely given. There is always new life in Christ

As we wait in joyful expectation of a better and healthier world as promised by God and manifested to us through the life, death, and resurrection of his son our Lord Jesus Christ, be hopeful --always be hopeful.
