
All-Diocesan Livestream Service with Bishop Taylor Sunday, September 20th @ 10am

From the Rector

Every Monday since the middle of March, the Bishops of the Episcopal Church and their Canons to the Ordinary have met via Zoom to learn, pray, and support each other. On Monday, August 13th, they were joined by Dr. Anthony Fauci. Dr Fauci, himself a worshipping man of faith, offered his wisdom and expertise to the gathered Church leaders. Our own Bishop Taylor took notes on what Dr. Fauci had to offer.

Bishop Taylor said Dr. Fauci "was eager to meet with religious leaders because a false tension had been created between public health and worship." "Public health principles are a gateway to worship." He remarked that we already know what is needed- universal wearing of masks, social distancing—at least six feet-, avoiding crowds, outdoors is better, and avoiding singing.

Having these principles in mind, and aware that the "numbers" in Los Angeles County are improving, on Sunday, September 6th, we will resume gathering in person for the Holy Eucharist. The service will be held at 7:30 am (due to the weather), and folks are asked to bring their own chairs. Distancing will be observed, masks will be worn, and Communion will be distributed in one kind. At 9 am, we will continue to have a service on Zoom and Facebook Live.

Your Vestry, staff, and I believe that this is a prudent way to move forward. So, I invite you to join this opportunity for our community to be reunited. Join in the celebration of the Eucharist. And sing the Lord's song – but in your heart and not out loud for the time being!



It seems to me that all I've been doing for months is reading, writing, discussing, thinking, and praying about all things "pandemic." It's time to take a break.

A while ago, I was asked to share my thoughts on why I became a deacon and I thought I would share them with you. There will be plenty of opportunities in the months ahead to deal with the pandemic and all the other issues challenging us in these complicated and unprecedented times.

Whenever I'm asked, "Why did you become a deacon?" I'm never quite sure how to answer. It's not that I don't know, but it's hard to determine what response would make the most sense to those asking.

My Dad owned "*Sneezy's Bar & Grill*" and it was there growing up that I learned two important lessons that have carried me through my life: most importantly, the art of hospitality and the other, how to cook. I watched my Dad treat all customers as if they were family, and I came to think of them as Aunts and Uncles. Along the way, I learned to cook, wait tables, and clean the steam table. My experience at Sneezy's Bar & Grill was the first step in my path to the diaconate, the opportunity to practice what I ultimately wound up doing all along -serving and making everyone feel like family.

After college, I taught high school English and eventually went to work for a major airline for the next 25 years. If you really want to learn about customer service and hospitality, work for an airline. Just before I retired from Delta, I attended culinary school and why not, since I already knew my way around a restaurant kitchen and loved to cook. Culinary School led to my stint as a personal chef and caterer.

A friend, who later became the Episcopal Bishop of Los Angeles, was one of my first clients. Besides catering some of his events, I started working on special projects on a part time basis early in 2002.

Well, catering lasted about thirty seconds; and during the next nine years, I served as the Bishop's Chaplain, assuming many responsibilities. Along the way, the Bishop asked me, "What are you doing with your life?" I replied, "What do you mean?" Without missing a beat, he said, "Maybe it's time to think about ordained ministry."

I'll admit that I had thought about entering the ministry many times, but I always allowed life to keep getting in the way. It took a little while, but I finally figured out that it was time to name it and claim it.

I was ordained a permanent deacon on January 14, 2005, and remained with the Bishop through 2010. In 2012, I began serving in a parish (Ascension) dedicating myself to extending hospitality and customer service to every parishioner, making each feel like aunts, uncles, cousins, brothers, and sisters.

So why did I become a deacon? I wanted to do what I've always been doing...serving God's people; making them feel special; and, by extending God's hospitality, letting them know how special they are in His eyes. And now I proclaim the gospel with the blessing of the church.

Live well, live blessed, proclaim the gospel.

VESTRY NEWS ~ Building Community and Moving Forward

For the last few months, most of us have experienced Church of the Ascension through Facebook Live or Zoom which can leave one with the impression that our Church is just something that happens online for an hour on Sundays. However, behind the scenes a lot of great things are happening.

First off, to bring you church online Charlie Noecker and Raymond Smith have been working to expand the wireless service inside of the church to facilitate our Sunday morning web cast. We are learning that many folks who would not otherwise be able to attend services are now joining in on a regular basis online, so we will be maintaining an online presence as we emerge from isolation.

Next, following advice from Dr. Anthony Fauci to the National Church, we are looking into starting services outside as early as Labor Day weekend. You will need to bring your own chairs, wear masks, and maintain social distance; but we have been informed that if we follow the rules, this is safe. More to follow as we finalize our plans.

We also have some significant capital improvement issues in the works. Our roof replacement plan now sets the summer of 2021 as the ideal time to replace our sanctuary roof. In addition, we are looking at scraping the old paint off the Parish House for some much needed patching and repair.

Finally, On September 27 we will kick off our 2020 stewardship campaign with the theme “Building Community.” We will take a few weeks to hear from our fellow parishioners about how our community has supported them and how we can support our church community as we prepare to emerge from isolation.

Things are moving ahead in our community; and in the months to come, we will be sharing more news; so stay tuned.
